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What is Virginia Rules?

<u>Virginia specific</u> law-related education program for youth in the Commonwealth

Web-based and interactive curriculum with comprehensive website (www.virginiarules.org) that is updated as laws change and needs/resources are identified

Lesson content is correlated with specific grade-level SOL requirements

Program Goals

- Educate young Virginians about the law
- Help participants develop skills needed to make sound decisions and to avoid breaking laws
- Encourage "active citizenship" in schools / communities among participants

Why Teach This Curriculum?

- Informed youth helps to reduce and prevent incidents and criminal activity
- Lesson-by-lesson
- Actual language of standards provided
- Interactive format
- Provides a tool to meet teaching objectives
- Endorsed by Secretary of Education

Virginia Rules Statistics — FY 2015

- 246 new VR instructor accounts created on the virginiarules.org website
- VR instructors have reported facilitating 134
 presentations to 17,039 students. This represents a
 44.2% increase in number of students taught in
 comparison to FY2014.
- 213,014 visits to the virginiarules.org website (a 14% increase from FY2014). This includes a 54% increase to visits to the homepage

VR Statistics — FY 2015 (con't)

- 2. Family Relationships and the Law (+ 261%)

Assessing Needs at Your School

Page 15 of the Instructor Guide

- Lessons address identified problems/issues
- Select lessons based on objective assessment

Virginia Rules Planning Tool-page 19

- 1. Examine DCV (discipline, crime and violence data) (SSIR Guide)
- 2. Talk with administrators and teachers
- 3. Identify VR lessons that address problem areas

Instructor Roles and Responsibilities

- Be fully oriented to the VR Program, its purposes, its components, and how the program operates.
- Examine the school DCV data to identify problem areas and select lessons to address problems identified.
- Collaborate with educators to implement in ways tailored to the needs of schools/communities.
- Be alert to "teachable moments."

Instructor Roles and Responsibilities

- Carefully prepare for delivering lessons
- Provide information to the Office of the Attorney General
- Stay alert to emerging issues and share your best ideas and suggestions with the Virginia Rules Program.

Lesson goal:

To provide an introductory overview of offenses involving property, including crimes in which property is destroyed and crimes in which property is stolen or taken against the owner's will.

Students will learn:

- what crimes against property entail
- what types of crimes involve taking property
- what types of crimes involve destroying property

Suggested grade levels:

High school students and advanced middle school students

Materials:

Virginia Rules "Property Crimes," student handout

Before the lesson:

- 1. Read the entire lesson plan.
- Make copies of handouts and any activity/worksheets used in the lesson.
- Obtain locality- and communityspecific information crime against persons.
- Give thought to appropriate local examples of the problems/issues discussed in the lesson.
